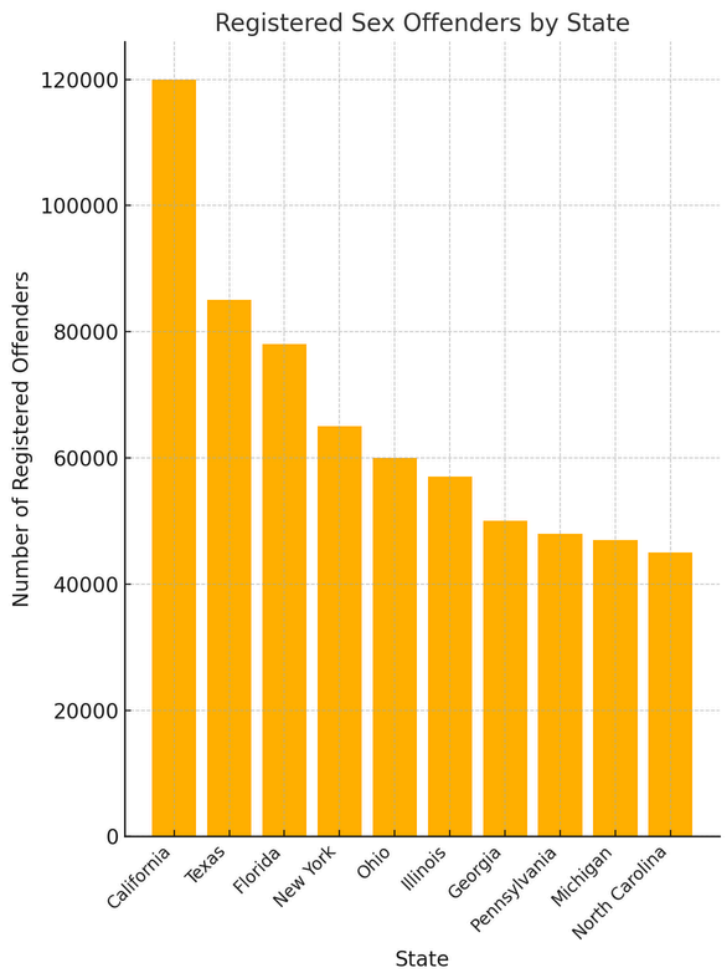

Large events magnify the challenge. With increased foot traffic and logistical demands, verifying the background of every individual present can seem impossible without the right tools and processes.

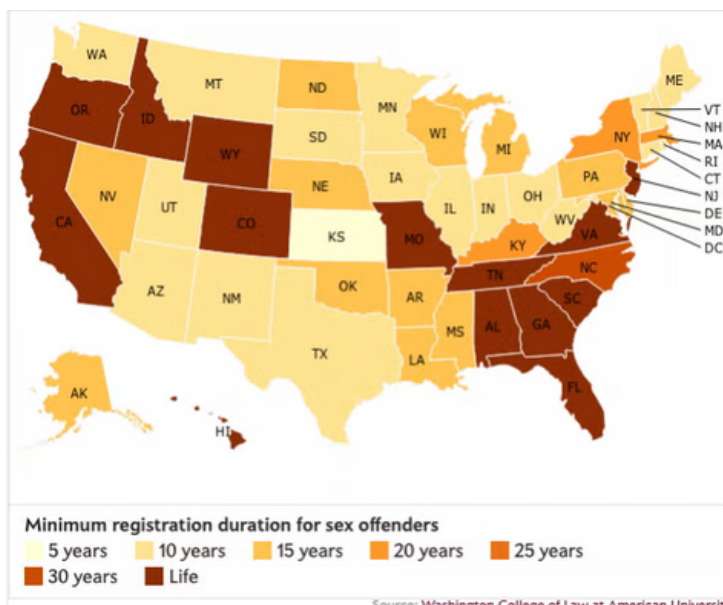
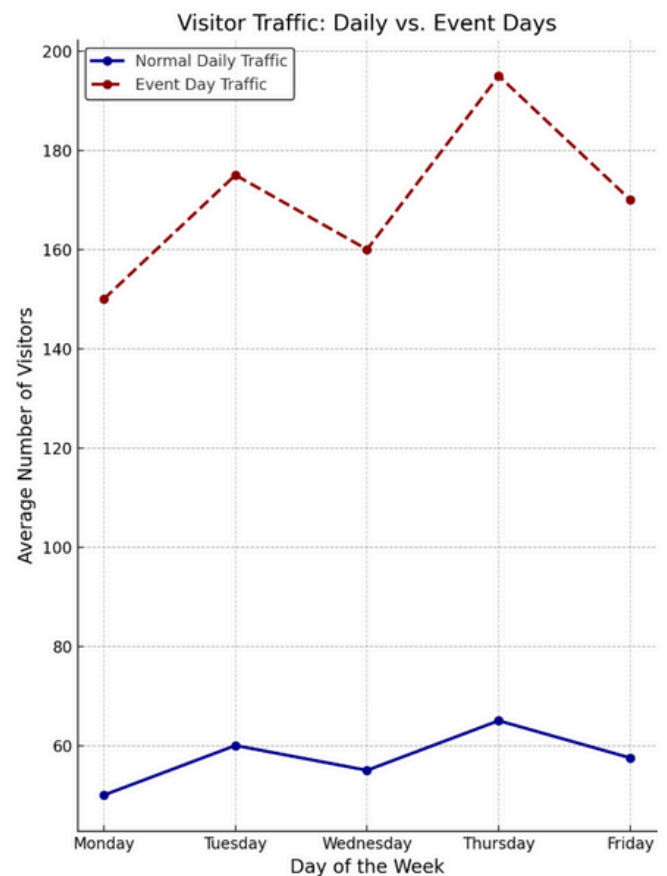

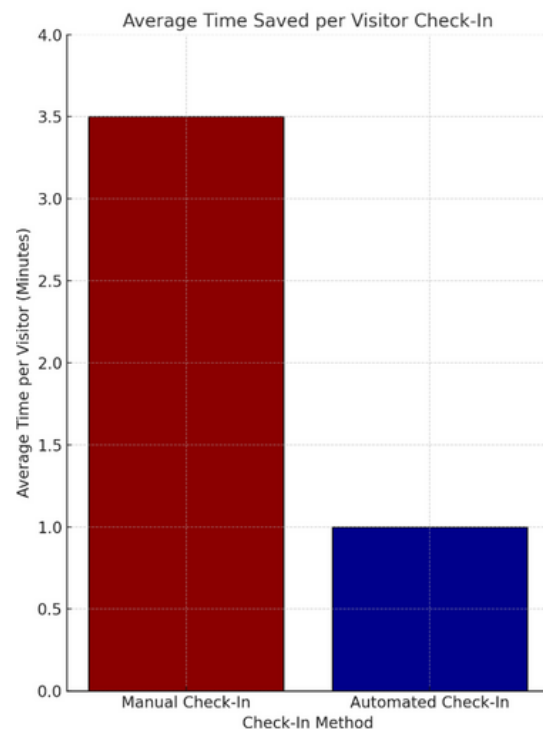
